The winning team was AUT. The AUT team was composed of Flynn, a fifth-semester student working under the Paramedic scope of practice; Coco-Sabine and Brianna, both fourth-semester students operating within the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) scope; and Dylan, a second-semester student working within the First Responder scope. Together, the team demonstrated impressive collaboration and professionalism.

Whitireia's Paramedicine facilities were excellent - well resourced, organised, and conducive to high-quality simulation learning. How did you prepare for the ANZSPA Simulation Challenge?

Our team had around four practice sessions leading up to the challenge, with each session including approximately three simulations covering a range of medical and trauma scenarios. It was incredibly helpful to receive guidance and advice from the Semester 5 and 6 students during these sessions, which really supported our preparation.



How did this experience help you build relationships with paramedicine students from other institutions?

This experience was a fantastic opportunity to connect with Whitireia students. From the moment we arrived on campus, they were incredibly welcoming, making sure we were oriented and knew where everything was. Throughout the day, there was a strong sense of camaraderie between the teams, with no negative or competitive comments, as everyone understood that we were "all in the same boat." Sharing dinner with the Whitireia students after a long day was a highlight, giving us the chance to relax and get to know each other on a more personal level. I am also very grateful to our sponsors and the event organisers, as their support made this experience possible and allowed us all to enjoy the day and build meaningful connections.



How did the Simulation Challenge benefit the team's learning?

The Simulation Challenge was highly beneficial for my learning as a Semester 2 student. It allowed me to apply the skills I had been practising in a realistic, high-pressure setting, which reinforced my understanding and highlighted areas for further development. For the rest of the team, the challenge offered an opportunity to work alongside students with different levels of experience and perspectives, which strengthened communication, collaboration, and problem-solving skills. Experiencing the variety of scenarios together encouraged shared learning and allowed us to see how each team member approached decision-making and patient care. Overall, the challenge not only enhanced our individual skills but also fostered teamwork and a deeper appreciation for the diverse approaches within paramedicine.

Participating in the ANZSPA Student Paramedic Simulation Challenge was an unforgettable experience. From the very beginning, I enjoyed not only the training itself but also the opportunity to meet and work with teammates at different stages of their paramedicine studies.

Traveling to Wellington added another layer of excitement, and visiting Whitireia's training facilities offered valuable insight into how another institution runs its programme.

Comparing the similarities and differences in training methods, course structure, and equipment between the two schools, and learning from the Whitireia students' experiences, was particularly enlightening.

Leading up to the challenge, I felt a mix of nervousness and excitement. The short notice for training made balancing preparation with assignments and other commitments challenging, but we made the most of the time available. Stepping onto the Whitireia campus for the first time was intimidating, but the students' friendly, welcoming attitude quickly put me at ease. While spending more time with them after the event would have been ideal, I am extremely grateful that the trip was fully funded by our sponsors—without their support, attending would not have been possible.



Overall, our team's success came from understanding each other's strengths and limitations. Everyone had a role to play, and ensuring that all members could contribute equally to patient care was essential to achieving the best outcomes. The experience highlighted the importance of collaboration, communication, and teamwork in paramedic practice.

Participating in the Simulation Challenge was an incredibly valuable experience for us as Māori and Pacific students. It provided a unique opportunity to connect with other Māori and Pacific paramedic students at Whitireia, particularly those in other Simulation Challenge teams or the organising committee, while also bringing the Māori and Pacific students in our Simulation team together.
